Analyzing the Internal Point of View from an Embodied Perspective

Two Views about Concepts

Traditional View	Embodied View	
Concepts are definition-like criteria of application of words.	Concepts are patterns of activation of neurons formed by interrelated experiences.	
e.g., My concept of BANANA is a set of necessary of sufficient conditions for the correct use of the word «banana»	e.g., My concept of BANANA is a pattern of activation of neurons formed in interacting with bananas and people talking about bananas: experiences of smell, taste, form; linguistic abilities, the ability to peel bananas; memories of jokes about bananas etc.	
Concepts are tidy.	Concepts are messy .	
Concepts are amodal (having them doesn't feel like anything)	Concepts are <i>multimodal</i> (having them is associated with a lot of sensory experiences)


A Traditional View About Legal Concepts
